Students then employed the skills of public-speaking to relay instructions and explanations to the visiting students. So much learning and so much fun!

We had full enrollment in both our Calm and Confident Parenting course, as well as our Shadbolt art class. Both were held in our Community Room. Hopefully we will continue to run it on a regular basis!

Parental Engagement -- What's the Big Deal? It Matters! Family Engagement = Student Success

Children with families engaged in their education are more likely to:

- Earn higher grades and test scores[1]
- Graduate from high school and attend post-secondary education[2]
- Develop self-confidence and motivation in the classroom[3]
- Have better social skills and classroom behavior
- Have better attendance

They are also less likely to:

- Suffer from low self-esteem
- Require redirection in the classroom[4]
- Develop behavioral issue

In the Community Newsletter each month, we will be including some information about why parental and family engagement is so important to a student's success.

Decades of research supports the assertion that families who are supported by the school to understand the learning goals of the students', can better help support their children's learning at school. Schools that provide this support and are working towards building strong relationships with the families, benefit as the staff and teachers gain new and important information about the students and the families and communities in which they belong. These involved parents feel supported and honoured and they then become advocates of the school and staff. With this greater understanding, the staff and school, can better support these students and families, as they understand more fully who the whole child is, which includes their family, their culture, and the assets they bring.

Schools that welcome and encourage community and family involvement are better able to serve their students. In community-minded schools, and in community schools, there is shared governance: the voices of parents and community members -- and students -- are welcome and integrated.

Everyone benefits: the students, the staff and the community, itself.







Course Information

The WorkSafe BC Occupational First Aid Level 1 course is an 8-hour program, designed to provide lifesaving first aid skills to individuals in the workplace. Students must be at least 16 years of age and be physically capable of performing the skills in this program. Successful candidates must demonstrate skill competency in practical skills and achieve 70% or higher on the written exam. Certification is valid for three years.

What the Participants will Learn:

- Assessment of the Scene & Patient(s) –using the Priority Action Approach
- Primary Survey –assessment of both Conscious & Unconscious Patient(s)
- Interventions for Possible Head and/or Neck Trauma –using Cervical Spine Control
- Airway & Breathing Interventions –to assist with Choking & Respiratory Distress
- Hemorrhage Control –techniques to Control Major Bleeding
- Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation -&useof an Automated External Defibrillator (AED)
- Minor Injury Management –treatment for Small Wounds, Burns, & Eye Injuries
- Management of Soft Tissue Injuries –including Sprains, and Repetitive Strain Injuries
- Recognition of Shock -treatment of Patients experiencing symptoms of Shock
- Awareness of Common Medical Conditions (i.e.: Asthma) and how to assist
- Duties of a First Aid Attendant -including Workplace environment & reporting a First Aid Record
